Some of Australia's herons have become very scarce in the southern half of the continent and are at risk of national or local extinction. In northern Australia

heron habitats and resources are largely pristine and consequently this region accommodates large numbers of certain species. A final chapter on population and conservation provides a useful summary of the present status of the Australian herons, some of whom are thriving and others who are in a very precarious position.
