VOTER REGISTRATION

REGISTERING TO VOTE IS THE FIRST STEP TO PARTICIPATING IN BROWARD COUNTY ELECTIONS. VOTERS MUST MEET SPECIFIC ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA AND COMPLETE THE REGISTRATION PROCESS BEFORE THE ESTABLISHED DEADLINE. BROWARD COUNTY OFFERS CONVENIENT WAYS TO REGISTER, ENSURING ACCESSIBILITY FOR ALL ELIGIBLE RESIDENTS.

ELIGIBILITY FOR VOTER REGISTRATION

- MUST BE A U.S. CITIZEN
- MUST BE A LEGAL RESIDENT OF BROWARD COUNTY
- MUST BE AT LEAST 18 YEARS OLD (OR PRE-REGISTER AT 16)
- MUST NOT HAVE BEEN ADJUDICATED MENTALLY INCAPACITATED WITHOUT VOTING RIGHTS RESTORED
- MUST NOT BE A CONVICTED FELON WITHOUT VOTING RIGHTS RESTORED

How to Register

Voters can register online, by mail, or in person at designated government offices. Online registration requires a Florida driver's license or ID card and a social security number. Paper applications are available at public libraries, government buildings, and the Supervisor of Elections office. Registrations must be submitted at least 29 days before an election.

UPDATING VOTER INFORMATION

IF YOU MOVE, CHANGE YOUR NAME, OR NEED TO UPDATE YOUR PARTY AFFILIATION, YOU MUST UPDATE YOUR VOTER REGISTRATION. THIS CAN BE DONE ONLINE OR BY SUBMITTING A NEW REGISTRATION FORM. KEEPING YOUR INFORMATION CURRENT ENSURES YOU RECEIVE THE CORRECT BALLOT AND VOTING INSTRUCTIONS.

POLLING LOCATIONS AND HOURS

Broward County operates numerous polling places to accommodate voters across the region. Each precinct has a designated location where residents can cast their ballots on Election Day. Polling locations are assigned based on the voter's residential address.

FINDING YOUR POLLING PLACE

VOTERS ARE ASSIGNED A SPECIFIC POLLING LOCATION, INDICATED ON THEIR VOTER REGISTRATION CARD. IF YOU ARE UNSURE OF YOUR PRECINCT OR NEED TO LOCATE YOUR POLLING PLACE, CONTACT THE BROWARD COUNTY SUPERVISOR OF ELECTIONS OR CONSULT OFFICIAL COUNTY RESOURCES.

POLLING HOURS

• POLLS TYPICALLY OPEN AT 7:00 A.M. AND CLOSE AT 7:00 P.M. ON ELECTION DAY

- VOTERS IN LINE AT CLOSING TIME ARE PERMITTED TO VOTE
- Hours may vary for early voting locations

EARLY VOTING AND MAIL-IN BALLOTS

TO MAKE VOTING MORE ACCESSIBLE, BROWARD COUNTY OFFERS EARLY VOTING AND MAIL-IN BALLOT OPTIONS. THESE SERVICES ALLOW RESIDENTS TO CAST THEIR VOTES AHEAD OF ELECTION DAY OR FROM THE COMFORT OF THEIR HOMES.

EARLY VOTING

Early voting periods usually begin several days before Election Day and are held at designated locations throughout the county. Early voting sites are open to all registered Broward County voters, regardless of their assigned precinct. This option helps reduce wait times and provides flexibility for those unable to vote on Election Day.

MAIL-IN BALLOT PROCEDURES

- 1. REQUEST A MAIL-IN BALLOT FROM THE SUPERVISOR OF ELECTIONS BEFORE THE DEADLINE
- 2. COMPLETE THE BALLOT FOLLOWING ALL INSTRUCTIONS
- 3. SIGN THE RETURN ENVELOPE
- 4. MAIL OR DROP OFF THE BALLOT AT OFFICIAL DROP BOX LOCATIONS
- 5. BALLOTS MUST BE RECEIVED BY 7:00 P.M. ON ELECTION DAY

MAIL-IN BALLOTS ARE AVAILABLE TO ALL REGISTERED VOTERS. TRACK YOUR BALLOT STATUS THROUGH OFFICIAL COUNTY RESOURCES TO ENSURE IT IS COUNTED.

VOTER ELIGIBILITY AND IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

To vote in Broward County, individuals must meet all eligibility requirements. Proper identification is required at polling locations and when submitting mail-in ballots. Familiarizing yourself with these requirements helps prevent issues on Election Day.

ID MUST INCLUDE BOTH A PHOTO AND SIGNATURE. IF YOU DO NOT HAVE PROPER ID, YOU MAY VOTE A PROVISIONAL BALLOT, WHICH WILL BE REVIEWED BY THE CANVASSING BOARD BEFORE BEING COUNTED.

PROVISIONAL BALLOTS

PROVISIONAL BALLOTS ARE PROVIDED TO VOTERS WHO DO NOT PRESENT VALID IDENTIFICATION OR WHOSE ELIGIBILITY IS IN QUESTION. THESE BALLOTS ARE REVIEWED AND COUNTED IF ELIGIBILITY IS CONFIRMED WITHIN THE PRESCRIBED TIMEFRAME.

KEY ELECTION DATES AND DEADLINES

STAYING INFORMED ABOUT ELECTION DATES AND DEADLINES ENSURES YOU DO NOT MISS YOUR OPPORTUNITY TO VOTE. BROWARD COUNTY PUBLISHES A CALENDAR OF IMPORTANT DATES FOR EACH ELECTION CYCLE.

IMPORTANT DEADLINES

- VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINE: 29 DAYS BEFORE ELECTION DAY
- MAIL-IN BALLOT REQUEST DEADLINE: 10 DAYS BEFORE ELECTION DAY
- EARLY VOTING PERIOD: USUALLY STARTS 10 DAYS BEFORE ELECTION DAY AND ENDS 3 DAYS BEFORE
- ELECTION DAY: AS SCHEDULED ON THE OFFICIAL CALENDAR
