Carlton won his second Cy Young Award with McCarver behind the plate in 1977. Hank Aaron didn't do it. The fact that this was accomplished in Pujols' first ten seasons only makes the achievement more, well, Ruthian. Albert Pujols' story goes beyond numbers, though.
