FEMALE ANATOMY AND THE PROSTATE

WOMEN DO NOT HAVE A PROSTATE GLAND. THE PROSTATE IS A MALE-SPECIFIC ORGAN, PART OF THE REPRODUCTIVE SYSTEM THAT SUPPORTS SPERM FUNCTION. IN FEMALES, THE REPRODUCTIVE ANATOMY CONSISTS OF STRUCTURES SUCH AS THE OVARIES, UTERUS, FALLOPIAN TUBES, CERVIX, AND VAGINA. NONE OF THESE ORGANS SERVE THE SAME FUNCTION AS THE PROSTATE, AND THERE IS NO NEED FOR WOMEN TO UNDERGO PROSTATE EXAMS.

SKENE'S GLANDS: THE "FEMALE PROSTATE" MYTH

DESPITE THE ABSENCE OF A PROSTATE, SOME DISCUSSIONS REFERENCE SKENE'S GLANDS, LOCATED NEAR THE FEMALE URETHRA. THESE GLANDS ARE SOMETIMES CALLED THE "FEMALE PROSTATE" DUE TO THEIR SIMILAR EMBRYOLOGICAL ORIGIN AND THE PRODUCTION OF CERTAIN FLUIDS. PROSTATE EXAMS: WHO NEEDS THEM?
