Instead, it repeatedly poses one question in a variety of forms: What if the world were other than it is? *As You Like It* is a set of experiments in which its characters conditionally change an aspect of their world and see what comes of it: what if I were not a girl but a man? What if I were not a duke, but someone like Robin Hood? What if I were a deer? What would you say to me now an [that is, if] I were your very, very Rosalind? (4.1.64-65). Much virtue in 'if', as one of its characters declares near the play's end; 'if' is virtual. It releases force even if the force is not that of what is the case.
