based at home. Meanwhile, the recent modest rise in the JobSeeker payment has been broadly
criticised as insufficient to help recipients find work and keep up with the costs of living,
entrenching financial stress and mental distress, and affecting motivation and skills. Of additional
concern is the rate of underemployment, which has overtaken the jobless rate. Most new jobs being
created are in part-time, casual or insecure gig work, affecting a higher proportion of young people.
Is job insecurity now the norm for many Australians? This title explains the fundamentals around the
measurement and types of unemployment and reveals who it most affects. It also examines the latest
employment trends and impacts of casualisation on job security. Government policies and social
sector strategies for tackling the economic and social consequences of unemployment and
underemployment are also featured. Finding a job, and indeed enough employment, can be hard
work in itself.

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
