The estimated cost to construct the scalding, framework, and a manual dunker, using all new materials, is around \$675. A used water heater and some resourceful scrounging will significantly reduce that price. The Whizbang Scalding's tank is sized to handle chickens only. But the same state-of-the-art temperature controls, coupled with the burner from a salvaged water heater, can be employed to heat a tank with turkey capacity. This option is discussed in the final chapter of the book.
