ADL through the Department of Defense has developed Experience API, a learning technology that can monitor all student online and offline interactions and archive these in data lockers or learning record stores. Its promoters envision education as children interacting with online learning systems where, based on past performance, algorithms will serve up what each student needs to know next. Through this digital curriculum, students create virtual educational identities at very young ages and learning devices are watching students as much as students are watching them.
