He gives Juliet a potion that would put her to sleep but not kill her, so that her family would think she is dead, setting her free. The priest sends the message to Romeo, telling him that Juliet is alive. However, the message never reaches him. After hearing about Juliet's death, Romeo arrives at her tomb, where he takes his life by drinking poison because he sees no sense in living a life without Juliet. Upon that, Juliet wakes up and tries to drink the last drops of poison from Romeo's lips to die, but when she sees that it is not enough, she takes a dagger and commits suicide. Both families then realize that their irrational hatred took the lives of young people, but it failed to stop true love, which is the sole morality of the story. This tragedy is the source of several timeless sentences that remain quoted to this day. Among them is the most famous one: O Romeo, o Romeo, wherefore art thou Romeo? It is as if Juliet almost curses her fate for falling in love with Romeo, yet it does not stop her from loving him. The balcony scenes in which Romeo declares his love to Juliet have remained a synonym to romantic declarations of love to this day, and all love stories are compared to this very one, known as the greatest love story ever.
